WELL-APPOINTED ROOMS CATER TO GUESTS.

Theresa Casey and her husband, Robert Gray, a graphic designer, wanted to create an office and a home-away-from-home for guests, they decided to give their unfinished basement's 600 square feet the same luxe look as the rest of the house.

The grandeur of the finished space is in the details, such as handsome doorknobs, hardwood floors and the bathroom's 1940s marble vanity. But everything is put together with a looseness that feels modern, not precious. "Nothing is too perfect," says Theresa. "It looks lived in."

1. USE TRANSITIONAL SPACES

A short, wide hallway that connects the various spaces becomes its own room, complete with built-in storage for tools, outof-season clothing and holiday decorations. Design, closets, wall colour, Theresa Casey, Casey Design Group.

2. MIX HIGH AND LOW

In the laundry room, white lacquered cabinets are dressed up with vintage drawer pulls and a marble countertop and backsplash. The front-loading washer and dryer allow for folding and storage space, which Theresa keeps tidy with labelled wire baskets and wood boxes. A vintage ladder adds hanging space and anchors a mini gallery wall. Rug, Elte; cabinets, Ikea; countertop, AST Stone; backsplash, Saltillo.

3. ADD THE ELEMENT OF SURPRISE

Making the switch to a high-efficiency wallmounted furnace, low-profile boiler and tank-less wall-mounted water heater meant Theresa could double the size of the bathroom and include a steam shower. To give it the air of an old Parisian apartment, she added brass sconces and a gorgeous tile floor. **Sink**, The Door Store; **sconce**, Casey Design Group; wall treatment, Kari Serrao.

4. MAKE IT LUXE

Guests shouldn't feel like they're in a leftover space. Theresa upholstered the bedroom walls with silk damask to give it extra warmth. The handsome wood headboard and mirrored side table channel 1930s glamour. Headboard, 507 Antiques.













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
